Overview

In this activity, you will explore the OSSD graduation requirements. This activity will help you plan your high school course choices, making you better prepared to achieve your post-secondary goals.

Lesson

Get Schooled



Not only do we see the need to earn a secondary school diploma, even famous performers, athletes, and artists often take the necessary steps to stay in school. They realize the importance of furthering their education.

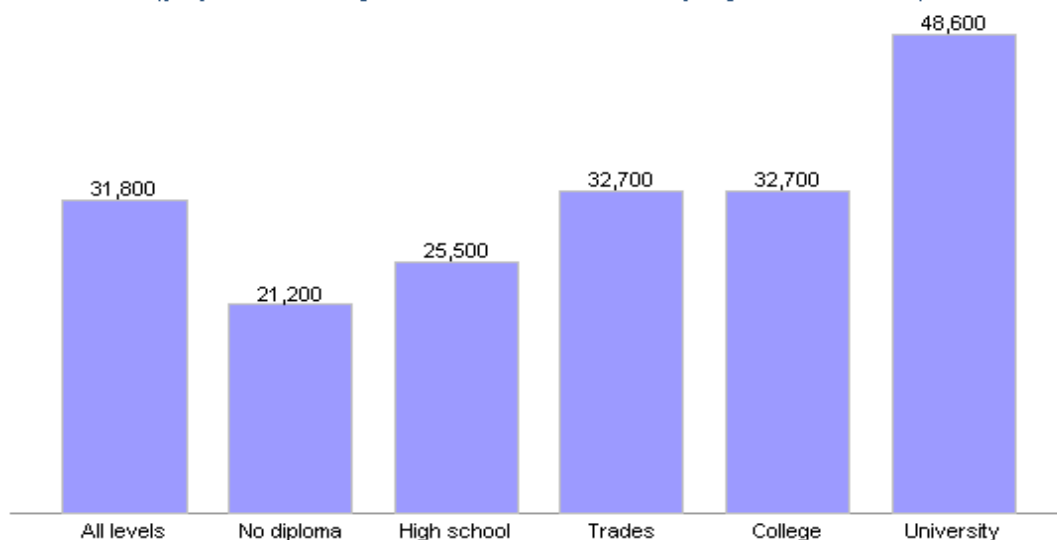
Higher education is also associated with higher earnings.

In 2000, those who completed their education with a high school diploma earned on average \$4,300 more than those without a high school diploma.

Achieving education beyond high school offered an even greater earnings benefit. On average:

- a trades or college graduate earned \$7,200 more than a high school graduate;
- a university graduate had earnings nearly double that of a high school graduate (\$23,000 more).

In order to ensure that you make the best decisions about your high school career and your plans for the future, it is important to understand how our school system currently functions. Read the information below to learn about the requirements for the Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

OSSD Requirements

Students must earn the following **18 compulsory credits** to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

- 4 credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in science
- 1 credit in Canadian history
- 1 credit in Canadian geography
- 1 credit in the arts
- 1 credit in health and physical education
- 1 credit in French as a second language
- 0.5 credit in career studies
- 0.5 credit in civics

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

- New **1 additional credit** (group 1): additional credit in English, **or French as a second language, or a Native language, or a classical or an international language**, or social sciences and the humanities, or Canadian and world studies, **or guidance and career education, or cooperative education**
- New **1 additional credit** (group 2): additional credit in health and physical education, or the arts, or business studies, **or French as a second language, or cooperative education**
- New **1 additional credit** (group 3): additional credit in science (Grade 11 or 12), or technological education, **or French as a second language, or computer studies, or cooperative education**

In addition to the compulsory credits, students must complete:

- **12 optional credits**
- **40 hours of community involvement activities**
- **the provincial literacy requirement (Ontario literacy test or course)**
